

Jasminum simplicifolium subsp. *australiense*
(Oleaceae)

Common name:

Jasmine.

Localities:

Kholo Creek, Moggill State Forest,
Priors Pocket, Upper Brookfield.

Growth form:

A scrambling shrub or climber.

Foliage:

Leaves are simple, up to
7 cm long, 5 cm wide.

Flowers and fruit:

Flowers are white and very strongly
perfumed, about 1.5 cm in diameter,
borne in few-flowered inflorescences.
The fruit is black and about 1 cm long
and wide.

Habitat:

Common in dry rainforest.

**Propagation and
Management:**

May be propagated from seed, which
should be sown fresh, or from cuttings,
which strike readily. Jasmine tolerates
a range of soils and also light frosts.

General:

May be pruned to form a relatively
compact plant, if desired. The sweetly
scented flowers make this a worthwhile
species to grow.
